8th April Week 11 Term 1 2020

Dear Parents and Carers,

"Happy Easter!" Well, almost. There are still a few days to go before we enter into the joys of "Chocolate Land!" Of course, one important thing to do before we loosen our belts on Easter Sunday, is to have a bit of a rethink about what actually happened on the first Easter day.

No doubt, if we had been alive in Jesus' time we, too, would have been astonished by the miracle of a resurrected corpse. Luke tells us that just as Jesus was entering the town of Naim, a funeral procession was coming out. The dead man was the only son of a widow. Jesus was filled with compassion for the widow and so went over to the coffin and said, "Young man! Get up, I tell you". The dead man sat up and began to talk and Jesus gave him back to his mother. Luke 7:11-17. Mark tells us how in like manner Jesus resurrected the corpse of the twelve year old daughter of Jairus, an official of the local synagogue.

"Little girl I tell you to get up". She got up at once and started walking around. "Give her something to eat." Mark 5:22-24, 35-44.

The two individuals raised to life by Jesus returned to their normal lives and at a later point in time they died, definitively. So, how was their "resurrection" different to Jesus'? Well, "Jesus' Resurrection was about breaking out into an entirely new form of life, into a life that is no longer subject to the laws of dying and becoming, but lies beyond it – a life that opens up a new dimension of human existence."

Unlike the widow's son and the daughter of Jairus, "Jesus has not returned to a normal human life in this world like Lazarus and the others whom Jesus raised from the dead. He has entered upon a different life, he has entered the vast breadth of God himself, and it is from there that he reveals himself to his followers." "In Jesus' Resurrection, a new possibility of human existence is attained that affects everyone and that opens up a future, a new kind of future, for mankind."

Now, what would you have been thinking if you were one of Jesus' followers on that first Easter day? "....they were simply overwhelmed by the reality, but after their initial hesitation and astonishment, they could no longer ignore that reality. It is truly he. He is alive; he has spoken to us; he has allowed us to touch him, even if he no longer belongs to the tangible in the normal way."

Jesus' disciples were quite used to Jesus performing the unusual: restoring sight to the blind; restoring mobility to the crippled; curing lepers of their disease. But now they had to grapple with a new understanding of Jesus: "He was quite different, no mere resurrected corpse but one living anew and forever in the power of God. And yet, at the same time, no longer belonging to our world, he was truly present there, he himself. It was an utterly unique experience, which burst upon the normal boundaries of experience and yet for the disciples was quite beyond doubt."



This week the events of Holy Week will remind us of our calling to be active Christians in the way we lead our own lives. If we are harbouring hurt within us, Jesus' actions can encourage us towards forgiveness and away from grudges and bitterness. We have all experienced hurt through the actions or words of another and this hurt we might have carried for years and deprived ourselves of the opportunity to embrace peace, hope, gratitude and joy by being unforgiving.

Forgiveness is a decision to let go of resentment and thoughts of revenge. In place of anger, confusion, maybe anxiety or even depression through being swallowed up by our own bitterness or sense of injustice, we can move away from our role as victim and relieve the power, that the offending person or situation has on our life. As we let go of hurt and resentment and don't allow them to define our life, we open ourselves to find compassion and understanding. Slowly, we embrace forgiveness and begin once more to live a truly Christian life.

Jesus' example to us on Good Friday, clearly defined for us the extent of God's forgiveness and the encouragement for us to do likewise in our own limited human way. But Jesus' example has an after effect as well, for on Easter Sunday he rose gloriously to a new life. No doubt this was the ambition of the three Nations that embraced forgiveness and reconciliation, instead of punishment and revenge. How about us this Holy Week? Is there unforgiveness we still have to deal with, that overshadows our lives?

So, when Easter Sunday does arrive we can join with the writer of Psalm 117 in saying, "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad". We can rejoice and be glad, because Jesus, through his humanity, has given us the opportunity of true resurrection. However, as the resurrected Jesus said to the once doubting Thomas, "You believe in me Thomas, because you have seen me; happy are those who have not seen me, but still believe." John 20:29.



Check out the Poem of the Week Challenge and aim to have your poem published on our school wall for Home Based Learning Poets. Mrs Neilson will love it!!





This year, Holy Week ceremonies and Easter Masses will not be accessible as usual. But the does not put a stop to our faith celebrations.


