Scribble and drawing lines or shapes is the first stage in writing!

Children need to develop skills including hand and finger strength, hand eye coordination, pencil grip, movements to cross the midline from left to right, strengthen upper body muscles and posture. These skills take time to develop and should be fun. Try one each day.

Written language


As children write, the hand communicates ideas from the brain to the page. The writing process is a visual representation of processing language and ideas. Before writing, children need to strengthen fine motor skills for pencil control and movement. Offer your child different writing tools such as pencils and crayons.


Helpful tips for developing Pre-Writing and Fine Motor Skills for hand strength:


- Look for letters in words. say some of the sounds the letters can make. Letters can make more than one sound.
- Encourage your child to write names of people in the family. Make sure they are visible to copy.
- **Develop** concentration skills through drawing pictures shapes, patterns and colouring in.

During early writing experiences, it is important that adults support and encourage the child to share ideas and 'have a go".




















Go on a Listening Walk...Spend some time inside or outside on a listening walk. Make a list of all the things you can hear and draw them. What sound does it start with?

Stick or write them in the right order.


Make someone else's name.



Use the counters to fill up the lines.


Talk about the shapes of the lines. Draw more lines to fill. Use large and small objects such as pasta, pebbles or playdough shapes.

When writing or tracing lines, start from the Left and move to the Right.


