


HARMONY DAY

IMPORTANT ROAD SAFETY INFORMATION

Dear Parents and Guardians,

I am writing to remind all families of the importance of road safety during drop-off and pick-up times at our school.

During the week, I personally witnessed a concerning incident where a parent in a two-toned Range Rover (license plate beginning with ERC) drove across the pedestrian crossing while our School Crossing Guard—who was wearing high-visibility clothing and holding a stop sign—was standing in the middle of the road, preparing to allow children to cross. This situation could have had serious consequences.

The safety of our students, staff, and community members is our top priority. Please ensure that you:

- Always obey the instructions of the School Crossing Guard.
- Come to a complete stop at pedestrian crossings and wait until the crossing is clear.
- Remain alert and avoid distractions such as mobile phones while driving near the school.
- Follow the designated drop-off and pick-up procedures to keep traffic flowing safely.

We ask for your cooperation to keep all children and families safe. Thank you for your attention to this important matter.

MATHEMATICS NEWS

Week 7 signals the start of the whole school 2025 Mathematical Thinking and Problem-Solving Program. The program runs alongside the classroom teaching and learning program for each grade, APSMO Maths Competitions in years 3 to 6, and the Mathematics Collaborative Coaching focus areas. For primary school students, working mathematically, mathematical thinking and problem-solving skills are vital for developing critical thinking, resilience and confidence. These skills help students approach challenges logically and creatively, building a strong foundation for academic success and real-life problem-solving.

The program varies in focus across the year but ultimately involves Mr O'Brien working with classroom teachers and students on a fortnightly basis. The program overview is below.

Terms 1 and 2 - Problem Solving Strategies

- Kindergarten, Year 1, Year 2
 - Introduction to problem-solving strategies
- Year 3, Year 4, Year 5, Year 6
 - Developing and extending problem-solving strategies and techniques
 - Exploring questions and activities related to APSMO competitions

Terms 3 and 4 – Open-Ended Fermi Problems

- Kindergarten, Year 1, Year 2
 - Part 1. Whole-class introduction to Fermi-style investigative problems with explicit teaching of the '3 Cs': Critical Thinking, Creative Thinking and Collaboration skills.
 - Part 2. Groups of students working together on an elementary Fermi-style problem and presenting their learning to their peers
- Year 3, Year 4, Year 5, Year 6
 - Part 1. Whole class Fermi problems with a focus on developing the '3 Cs': Critical Thinking, Creative Thinking and Collaboration skills.
 - Part 2. Individuals or small groups exploring their own Fermi problems with a focus on applying the '3 Cs' and presenting their learning to their peers and/or other grades



Year 3 has been learning circus techniques for class sport this term. This is a combination of different movements, positions and balancing, and requires very good team work!



















In English, our Year 4 class has been studying the text "The Thing About Oliver" by Deborah Kelly.

The School Opal card

The School Opal card gives eligible students free or discounted travel between home and school using metro, train, bus, ferry and light rail services you nominate in your application.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for a School Opal card, students may need to live a minimum distance from their school:

Years K-2 (Infants)

There is no minimum distance.

Years 3-6 (Primary)

More than 1.6km straight line distance or at least 2.3km walking.

Years 7-12 (Secondary)

More than 2.0km straight line distance or at least 2.9km walking.



If you live too close to be eligible for free travel, you may still qualify for a School Term Bus Pass, which offers travel on buses between home and school at a discounted rate for the whole school term.

Who needs to apply

A new application is only required if the student has not had a School Opal card before.

If the student already has a School Opal card and is changing schools, campuses or home address, you will need to update their Opal card for the new school year before mid-December at transportnsw.info/ssts-update

How to apply

Applications for next year open at the start of Term 4 this year.

Step 1

Once the new school has confirmed your child's enrolment, complete the application at transportnsw_info/school-students

Step 2

The school endorses your application.

Step 3

Once Transport for NSW has approved the application, a School Opal card will be sent to the address provided on the application.



A parent or guardian must apply for students 15 years and under. Students 16 years and over can apply for themselves.



Better together

The School Opal card is only for travel to and from school. So it's a good idea to get a Child/Youth Opal card for travel after hours, on weekends or during school holidays.

Child/Youth Opal card benefits

- Concession fares across the Opal network
- Half-price travel after eight paid journeys each week*
- \$1 transfer discount for every transfer between modes (metro/train, ferry, bus or light rail) as part of one journey within 60 minutes from the last tap off!
- Set auto top up and tink it to your credit or debit card so there's always enough value on the card to travel.




